


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Letter from the Festival Co-Directors

To our festival attendees, we extend a warm welcome to the 6th Filipino American International Book Festival. It is a delight to gather in person with you again.

This year, our festival theme is "Hiraya/ Emergence: Writing Towards the Future." "Hiraya" is a Tagalog word for imagination, the embodiment of one's hopes and dreams—first the flower, then the fruit. Having



postponed the festival for a year due to COVID-19, this celebration of Filipino/a/x literature and art is an emergence from the difficulties and isolation of the past three years.

Historically, the festival has been held in-person at the San Francisco Public Library every two years since 2011. It was founded by Gemma Nemenzo and the Literacy Initiatives International Foundation, Inc., with Philippine American Writers and Artists taking over its organization in 2013. It remains the only festival in the United States to bring together Filipino/a/x writers from around the world, from downtown San Francisco to the Philippines.

As we also celebrate Filipino American History Month this October, we mark the history of this unique Bay Area literary festival, alongside the legacies of Filipino American theater in SOMA Pilipinas, anthologies such as Liwanag, and the birthplace of ethnic studies. These throughlines run through the work of several of our festival authors and performers.

We extend our gratitude to our partners at the San Francisco Public Library, whose support has allowed this sixth festival to blossom so beautifully. We feature award winning and internationally lauded authors as well as emerging writers and small presses, from a Nobel Peace Prize winner to an 11-year-old self-published picture book author. In the breadth of our programming, our genres span poetry, graphic memoir, comics, fiction, play-writing, and children's literature. We are able to offer all of it for free to the public, because of the generosity of SFPL, the Filipino American Center, our donors, community partners, and the hard work of our festival organizing committee rock stars.

The festival reflects the phenomenal growth of Filipino/a/x literature of the past few years. Despite the uncertainty of current times, it is through the sharing of our stories that we move together towards the next.

Participant Bios

Ramon Abad is a Filipino American puppeteer, artist and teacher. He is also a San Franciscobased illustrator, designer & animator; dedicated to the ideal that good, well-made visuals are based on good, well-written narratives. His clients include IDEO, Cisco Systems, Veracode, Levi Strauss & Co, West Elm, Pottery Barn, PBS Hawaii, Will Vinton Studios (Portland, OR), & Polka Theatre (London, UK). Find him at ramonabad.com.

Cyra Africa is the 7th of 11 siblings. She grew up and studied in 2 of the 7,100 Philippine Islands. Their many childhood pets included a lazy water buffalo, a bored cobra, cats who hunted birds and snakes, dogs named after celebrities, a pig who thought he was a dog, and a rooster with a crooked beak. She has one child, one pet, and is 5 minutes away from 5 of her siblings, as the magic carpet flies. Her fun and artistic family tolerates and supports her LEGO hobby, toy hoarding, puppeteering attempts and creating a fairy garden. She is currently focused on writing children's stories about Filipino engkanto (supernatural beings). This introvert dreams of being a published author to support her book addiction but more importantly, to help continue sending books to elementary schools in small barrios in the Philippines where most engkanto stories are still being told. She is the creator of "Waray Words with Fae," a YouTube series created to teach simple words and phrases in Waray and Tagalog with their English counterpart. Erina C Alejo (they/she/siya) is an artist, researcher and educator who works across decades and geographies to construct archives on labor, displacement, family and communal history, born and raised in San Francisco. They are a third-generation San Francisco renter with family, documented through A *Hxstory of Renting* (2015–ongoing). Alejo administers grants for the Office of the Vice President for the Arts at Stanford University. They also participate in Stanford's Creative Cities, a working group reimagining the role of art in the urban sphere. Alejo's 2020

SFMOMA commission, My Ancestors Followed Me Here, is an outgrowth of their previous work on gentrification and community resilience. Alejo directs SoMapagmahal Photo Mxntorship Program, is co-founder and co-organizer of Appendix Collective, and serves on SOMA Pilipinas's Arts and Culture Committee. Find them at erinacalejo.com.

Ani Rosa Almario, Ph.D. (she/her) is the Vice-President for Product Development of Adarna House (www.adarna.com.ph, the Philippines' first and largest children's book publishing house. She also runs a progressive K-12 institution called the Raya School (www.raya.edu. ph). Ani lectures on children's literature at the University of the Philippines Diliman and on curriculum and early childhood at Miriam College. She is the secretary-general of the Philippine Board on Books for Young People (PBBY) and a former president of the Book Development Association of the Philippines (BDAP) and the Reading Association of the Philippines (RAP).

Gina Apostol's (she/her/siua) fourth novel. Insurrecto, was named by Publishers' Weekly one of the Ten Best Books of 2018, selected as an Editor's Choice of the NYT, and shortlisted for the Dayton Prize. Her third book, Gun Dealers' Daughter, won the 2013 PEN/Open Book Award. Her first two novels, Bibliolepsy and The Revolution According to Raymundo Mata, both won the Juan Laya Prize for the Novel (Philippine National Book Award). She has received the Rome Prize. a Civitella Ranieri Fellowship (Umbria, Italy), and the Emily Harvey Foundation Fellowship, among others. Her essays and stories have appeared in The New York Times, Los Angeles Review of Books, Foreign Policy, Gettysburg Review, Massachusetts Review, and others. She lives in New York City and western Massachusetts and grew up in Tacloban, Leyte, in the Philippines. She teaches at the Fieldston School in New York City. Find her at ginaapostol.com.

Robin Kitana Aquilizan (she/her) is a 24 year old Filipina American. She grew up in Union City, CA where she was a youth community organizer and




